

#### 2.0 Safety

Follow the instructions carefully next to these warning symbols! Not paying careful attention to these instructions could result in physical injury or damage to the wheelchair or the environment. Wherever possible, safety information is provided in the relevant chapter.

#### 2.1 Seating related symbols and labels used on the product

The signs, symbols and instructions affixed to the wheelchair comprise part of the safety facilities. They must never be covered or removed. They must remain present and clearly legible throughout the entire lifespan of the wheelchair.

Replace or repair all illegible or damaged signs, symbols and instructions immediately. Please contact your dealer for assistance.

- Fig 2.1: Warning Danger of finger entrapment
- Fig 2.2: Warning Ensure that the seat interface quick release is screwed in tight before using your wheelchair, especially on a slope
- Fig 2.3: Warning Do not drive your wheelchair on a slope with the backrest reclined and/or the seating in standing mode

#### 2.2 Safety: Temperature

### ANGER! / WARNING!

• If you do not use the wheelchair, ensure that it is not exposed to direct sunlight for lengthy periods of time. Certain parts of the wheelchair, such as the seat, the back and the armrests can become hot if they have been exposed to full sunlight for too long. This may cause burns or allergic reactions to the skin.

# 2.3 Safety: Moving parts


### Anger! / warning!

A wheelchair has moving and rotating parts. Contact with moving parts may result in serious physical injury or damage to the wheelchair. Contact with the moving parts of the wheelchair should be avoided.

- Powered tilt in space adjustment
- Powered seat elevator option
- Powered recline adjustment
- Swing-away bracket of the controller

### 2.4 Safety: Choking hazard DANGER! / WARNING!

This mobility aid uses small parts which under certain circumstances may present a choking hazard to young children.







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#### Safety: Vent tray

### 🖄 DANGER! / WARNING!

Using a vent tray will affect the stability and overall weight of your wheelchair.

- Make sure that the batteries and the ventilator are securely fastened to the tray before use.
- Familiarise yourself with the increased size of the wheelchair before driving to prevent potential collisions.
- When activating the recline backrest make sure that the area around the vent tray is clear.
- Be aware that the vent tray assembly can cause a finger trap hazard when the backrest is reclined.
- The vent tray is not designed to hold anything other than the vent unit and its batteries, it is not designed to hold an oxygen bottle etc. Use of these items may cause your wheelchair to become unstable.
- The vent tray must be installed and maintained by a Sunrise Medical authorised dealer.

#### Safety: Swing away tray:

### / DANGER! / WARNING!

- The maximum weight allowed for the tray is 2.5kg.
- Do not overload the tray, this could cause the tray to break or could cause the chair to become unstable.
- Do not leave lit cigarettes or other heat sources on the tray as this could cause the tray to deform and mark.
- Ensure that all extremities and clothing are clear when positioning the tray for use.

# 2.6 Instructions for use with Remote Key Fob Stop Switch fitted.

### 

These instructions for use must be read by all responsible adults who come into contact with this Powered wheelchair, they should be also be read in conjunction with the user information provided with the remote key fob unit and the warnings given in relevant sections of the user manual

# 

Because the remote key fob sender unit can immobilise the powered wheelchair without the prior notice of the user, it must be only be used by a responsible adult.

The key fob should not be left unattended, and must not be left within reach of un-authorised persons or children.

# 

Before and each and every time the wheelchair is used the attendant/carer must establish that the remote stop function is operating satisfactorily before proceeding with its use.

#### User warnings and limitations of use:

# A NOTE / CAUTION!

Control of the powered wheelchair remains with the user however when the button on the remote unit is pressed the powered wheelchair's electronic drive inhibit function will be activated. This will bring the powered wheelchair to a controlled stop if it is moving, and will prevent the user from driving the chair in any direction. The inhibit function will be deactivated when the remote button is pressed once more.

## A NOTE / CAUTION!

Care should be taken to ensure the powered wheelchair is not immobilised in a dangerous environment or position in use. (E.g. on crossing a road or level crossing)

### \Lambda warning!

Although the drive inhibit function will bring a powered wheelchair to a controlled stop Sunrise Medical Ltd strongly recommends the fitting of a lap belt or harness to the chair, and that the user should wear it at all times when occupying the chair.

## A NOTE / CAUTION!

The stopping of the wheelchair is in a controlled manner, therefore it must be recognised that there is a finite distance to stop the wheelchair and it is not an emergency stop (dead stop).

## A NOTE / CAUTION!

The remote stopping functionality of the wheelchair is wholly dependent on the integrity of the radio communications link between the transmitter (key fob) and the receiver (wheelchair). If the integrity of the communications link is broken or corrupted, it may not be possible to stop the wheelchair. Sources of communications disruption may be caused by but not limited to-

- The battery power of the transmitter or receiver is not sufficient to maintain communication.
- The environment obstructs the transmitted signal, e.g. the wheelchair must be in direct line of sight, or absorbs the transmitted signal, e.g. large metallic objects close by.
- The distance between the transmitter and the wheelchair exceeds the range of the transmitting / receiving devices.
- Other interfering radio transmitting devices, e.g. garage door remote controls, mobile phone, radio transmitting towers, emergency services communications, power distribution cables.
- Environmental effects; electrical storm, rainwater ingress into the transmitting/ receiving devices.


#### 3.0 General description & Intended Use

This wheelchair is equipped with Sedeo Lite seating system. The Sedeo Lite seating system provides excellent support for the head, torso, arms and legs. Optimal body support ensures maximum independence for the wheelchair user.

The wheelchair must be adjusted by a qualified specialist. Incorrect settings may have negative consequences for the seating posture.

Main components (Fig. 3.1):

- 1. Headrest
- 2. Joystick
- 3. Armrest
- 4. Seat cushion
- 5. Legrest
- 6. Backrest



#### 4.0 Setting up the seating system

The average wheelchair user does not exist. This is why Sunrise Medical wheelchairs can be pre-set according to specific needs of the user.

Pre-settings are carried out once, the first time the wheelchair is going to be used. They must be executed by qualified specialist, unless explicitly stated otherwise.

#### 4.1 Pre-set seat depth

#### Backrest frame depth (Fig 4.1):

- 1. Unscrew and remove 2 x (A) on both sides.
- 2. Adjust (B) to the desired position.
- 3. Replace and tighten for all (A) fasteners.

#### 4.2 Pre-set seat width

To adjust the seat frame width, the seat plate and back frame width needs to be adjusted at the same time. For easy explanation these are mentioned in fig 4.2 and 4.3 separately.


#### Seat frame width (Fig. 4.2 & 4.3)

Lift the seat cushion off the  $\mbox{Velcro}\ensuremath{\mathbb{C}}$  strips to access the seat plates.


- 1. Unscrew and remove 10 x (A).
- 2. Adjust (B) to the desired position.
- 3. Adjust (C) to the desired position.
- 4. Replace and tighten all (A) fasteners.


### ▲ NOTE / CAUTION!

There are 2 sizes of the back frame width adjustment. One for 30-34 cm and one for 36-40 cm.

#### Sling Back with adjustable straps (Fig 4.7)

Backrest height SEDEO LITE Back cushion (Fig 4.6)

1. Loosen 2 x (A) on both sides.

3. Tighten all (A) fasteners.


2. Adjust (B) to the desired position.

The wheelchair has a Sling backrest that can be adjusted to the curvature of the back in order to achieve a comfortable sitting position and good stability. The user can sit in the wheelchair when adjustments are being made to the curvature of the backrest.

- 1. Flip back (A).
- 2. Loosen or tighten (B) with Velcro.

#### J3 Back (Fig 4.8)

NOTE: The Jay 3 Backrest can be used in conjunction with the Sedeo Lite seating system. Please refer to the J3 Back Owner's Manual for fitting and adjustment.

- 3. Replace and tighten (A) & (B).

- This product is only to be used to position a single person in a wheelchair.
- Lap straps are not suitable for transit purposes, approved occupant restraint systems must be used.
- Failure to heed these warnings may result in severe injury or death.
- Ensure that the carer or attendant is trained in the correct operation of the belts.
- Untrained carers or attendants may lead to delays, if an emergency situation occurs.


1. Attach (A) to the seating frame using a screw on the left and on the right. (Fig 4.55)


#### Positioning an person with a lapstrap


- Adjust the lap strap to suit, leaving no more than a hand's width gap for comfort and safety (Fig 4.56).
- The hand clearance should be with the lap strap under normal tension and not allow large gaps or loops.
- Generally, the lap strap should be fixed so that the straps sit at an angle of approximately 45° (Fig. 4.57), and when correctly adjusted should not allow user to slip down in the seat.
- Place the strap loosely across the seat with the opening end of the buckle facing to the right for a left-handed person and to the left for a right-handed person. Pass the other ends of the strap through the gap between the backrest posts and the backrest.


# ▲ DANGER! / WARNING!

- Always make sure that the lap strap is correctly secured and adjusted prior to use.
- If a strap is too loose it could cause the user to slip down and cause serious injury.
- Check lap strap and securing components at regular intervals for any signs of fray or damage. Replace if necessary.
- When servicing, check for correct operation of the release buckle and for any signs of wear on the material or plastic brackets.
- Regular Checks/Activities:
- As with all positioning components, there is a need for corrective adjustments as the person changes their seating position over time.
- Check the belts regularly for correct fitting, to ensure the safety and comfort of the user.









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#### 5.0 Using the seating system

#### 5.1 Getting in and out of the wheelchair (Transferring)

Sunrise Medical recommend that you consult your healthcare professional for assistance in developing your personal front or side transfer technique to best suit your needs and avoid any personal injury.

### 🖄 DANGER! / WARNING

To prevent a fall:

- Ensure controller is switched off during transfers to avoid unintentional movement. If you fail to do so you may touch the joystick and cause your system to move when you do not expect it.
- Ensure that the free wheel switch has been set to 'drive', 🛄 General manual.
- Rotate the front casters so that they point forward.
- Work with your health care professional to learn all safe methods for transfers.
- Make sure motor brakes are engaged. This keeps the system from moving when you transfer.
- It is dangerous to transfer on your own. It requires good balance and agility. Be aware that there is a point during every transfer when the seating system seat is not below you.
- Learn how to position your body and how to support yourself during a transfer.
- Have someone help you until you are sure you can do a safe transfer on your own.
- Do not stand on the footrest. Putting your full weight on the footrest may lead to wheelchair damage and to hazardous situations, including the wheelchair tipping up.
- Make sure your feet do not "hang up" or get caught in the space between the footrests.

#### 5.2 Preparing for forward transfer


Move your wheelchair as close as possible to the seat you intend to transfer to.





#### 5.3 Preparing for side transfer

### DANGER! / WARNING


- Move your system as close as you can to the seat you are transferring to. If possible, use a transfer board.
- Transfer as far back onto the seat surface as you can. This will reduce the risk that you will miss the seat or fall.

- Some versions of the controller will need to be swung aside.
- Remove the tray before folding back the armrest.
- Do not lean on the armrest when folded back.

#### Flip back armrest (Fig 5.4)



The joystick is mounted with a mechanism that allows the joystick to be locked in two forward positions.


- 1. Push (A) outwards or inwards.
- 2. To return to forward position, push the back of the joystick forward until it locks into place (click)



- 2. To return to forward position, push the back of the joystick forward until it locks into place (click)



Swinging back the controller bracket will allow you to pull up close to a table. Full operation of the controller remains possible





#### 6.1 Manual seating options

#### Zippie Manually elevating legrests knee angle (Fig 6.1)

The angle of the comfort legrests can be adjusted independently of each other.

- 1. Lift leg to raise legrest (A).
- 2. Operate lever (B) to lower legrest.

### Anger! / warning!

• Risk of trapping fingers! When moving the legrest up or down, do not put your fingers in the adjusting mechanism between the moving parts of the legrest.





#### 6.2 (Powered) seating options

The wheelchair can be equipped by the following powered options to adjust your seating position. These options can be operated by the user without the use of tools.

#### Powered adjustable seating options (Fig. 6.4 - Fig. 6.6)




- 1. Powered tilt function
- 2. Powered seat elevator
- 3. Powered backrest recline
- 4. Powered elevating legrests

The wheelchair may be equipped with a feature that allows the powerchair to be driven up to 4.5kph/3mph when the seat is elevated, this feature is called C-Me. For guidance with user weight limits and recommended chair configuration when using C-Me, please refer to your Sunrise Medical authorized dealer.


## A DANGER!

- Use of the powered adjustable seating options may influence the stability of the wheelchair.
- Only use the powered adjustable seating options when the wheelchair is on a flat surface! Do Not attempt to operate any power seating option while positioned on an incline.
- Please stay clear of any powered actuator while the component is in motion. Sunrise power mechanisms move over large ranges of travel. Users should be aware of their surroundings while components are in motion.
- While driving this seating system in the reclined, elevated, or tilted position use caution.
- Do Not attempt to operate any power seating option while this seating system is in motion.
- Do not attempt to operate the lift or tilt power seating options around children.
- Through programming it is possible to reverse the direction of all powered seating functions, ensure you know which direction your seat is going to move before operating.
- Please be aware that the lift/tilt modules present a trap hazard. Make sure that during operation the lift/tilt modules are free from all clothing, hands, feet and other extremities, to prevent injury.
- Do not drive on ramps or slopes with the seating in the elevated position. Before attempting to climb or descend a slope, return the wheelchair to a standard seated drive position, with the backrest upright.
- This power system is designed to automatically reduce the maximum driving speed to a creep and/or C-Me mode when certain power seating limits are reached. Depending on the configuration of the chair there might be multiple creep and/or C-Me speeds.
- Before operating your chair in creep and/or C-Me mode, read all warnings and guidelines related to this feature. They will help in understanding how to reduce the risk of a fall or tip-over and how to identify environmental conditions that could affect your safety when driving while the chair is in creep and/or C-Me speed.
  - 1. When driving indoors or outdoors, in creep mode, it should only be used on flat, level, and hardscape surfaces.
  - 2. Driving in creep mode should never be attempted on uneven terrain like: gravel, grass, bumpy surfaces, uneven pavement, or hills.
  - 3. NEVER raise the seat when the chair is being operated in the proximity of any of the terrain types listed above, or on any uneven surface.

# 7.0 Reducing the seating system size for transportation purposes

### Anger! / Warning!

The wheelchair can be reduced in size for transportation without a passenger. Any components of the seating system that can be detached easily should be removed. Store away such components safely so that they can not cause injury or damage, or become damaged themselves.


#### 7.1 Seat cushion

#### Removing the seat (Fig.7.1)

1. Pull (A) upwards.

#### Replacing the seat (Fig 7.2)

1. When replacing, align the velcro strips with each other.



#### Removing the back cushion (Fig 7.3)


- 1. Push (A) forward to unlock.
- 2. Lift cushion (B)


#### Positioning the back cushion (Fig 7.4)


- 1. Line up (A).
- 2. Push back into place (B).


# A NOTE / CAUTION

If properly inserted the pins will 'click' into a locked position.









#### 7.3 Swing away legrests (Fig 7.5)

#### Removing a swing-away legrest

- 1. Loosen the calf band.
- 2. Push the catch (A) to the rear in order to unlock the legrest.
- 3. Swing the legrest outwards.
- 4. Remove the legrest (B) from its bracket by lifting.

You should hear a click when replacing the legrest. This indicates that the legrest has locked into place.


Danger of finger entrapment (Fig.7.6)




#### $\triangle$ Warning!

When the Manual Elevating swing away legrest is removed, carry the legrest at the handle intended for removing/carrying (A).

When carrying at B and at the same time releasing lever C there is a risk of finger trapping.





#### 8.0 Maintenance and cleaning

#### 8.1 General Maintenance

- All fasteners should be checked monthly for wear, such as loose bolts or broken components.
- Loose fasteners should be re-tightened according to the installation instructions.

Please refer to the table below for needed Torques. Note: it will be necessary to use a torque wrench.

- Check all straps monthly for fraying, ripped seams or other indications of excessive wear damage. Discontinue use if damage is found.
- Chest straps should be replaced at the first indication of damage and/or excessive wear.
- If a broken or loose component is found, discontinue use immediately and contact your authorised Sunrise Medical supplier for replacement.
- Check all Velcro fastening straps for correct adhesion when pressed together.
- Ensure that any contamination, such as fluff, hair, etc is removed from the Velcro straps. Such contamination may affect adhesion.

#### 8.2 Cleaning your seating system

The wheelchair should be wiped over once per week with a slightly damp, not wet, cloth and any fluff or dust that has accumulated around the actuators should be blown or dusted away.

## 

Make sure that you dry all parts of your wheelchair if it becomes wet or damp after cleaning or if it is used in a wet or damp atmosphere.

### Anger! / warning!

It is important that should the wheelchair be used by more than one person it is cleaned thoroughly to ensure there is no cross infection.

#### 8.2.2 Cleaning and inspection of your seating

### Anger! / Warning!

Tears, dents, wearing or slackening of upholstery particularly near to metal could result in poor posture or lower levels of comfort and pressure relief.

#### **Cleaning instructions for seating:**

If there is a washing label inside the cushion cover, you can wash the cover. Follow the instructions on the washing label. Take out the foam inlays prior to washing and close the Velcro fasteners!

### 

Do not use organic solvents such as thinner, benzine or white spirit.

Do not chemically clean the upholstery. Do not iron or spin-dry the upholstery.

Where upholstery cannot be removed, clean regularly to prevent build up or soiling. Clean with a damp soapy cloth however disinfectants may be used in dilution as specified by their manufacturer. Ensure surfaces are rinsed well with clean water and dried thoroughly.

#### 8.3 Hygiene measures when being re-used:

Prior to the wheelchair being re-used, it must be carefully prepared. All surfaces which come into contact with the user must be treated with a disinfection spray.

To do this, you must use a suitable disinfectant for rapid alcohol-based disinfection of medical products and medical devices.

Please take into account the manufacturer's instructions for the disinfectant you are using.

### NOTE / CAUTION!

- Do not use solvents, bleaches, abrasives, synthetic detergents, wax polishes or aerosols.
- Disinfectants may be used in dilution as specified by their manufacturer.
- Ensure surfaces are rinsed with clean water and dried thoroughly.

#### 8.4 General cleaning instructions:

### \Lambda NOTE / CAUTION!

- You should remove stains on your seat as soon as possible.
- After a long period of use, you should clean the cover of your seat with a standard commercially available dry foam cleaning agent.
- You should always clean the whole surface and not just individual spots in order to avoid unattractive edges. The longer you wait the more difficult it will be to remove them.
- Avoid powerful rubbing with aqueous solutions. This will roughen up cover fabric.
- Dirt stains (eg. beer, blood, cola, red wine etc) are best removed with the dry foam cleaning agents or with a mild-action detergent.
- Please follow the respective instructions for use when treating the covers.
- The covers should be allowed to dry for at least 48 hours after cleaning with foam cleaning agents.
- Grease stains (eg. ballpoint pen, lipstick, chewing gum etc). Use a proprietary stain remover. Carefully rub the soiled location on the surface only with a clean cloth impregnated with the stain remover.
- Use only a very small quantity of stain remover.
- Test a small inconspicuous area first.
- The upholstery material must not be saturated, since the stain remover might then attack it and destroy it.
- Powerful rubbing should be avoided on the silk-printed scales, for example, the arrows on the seat plate and the scale for the seat width adjustment
- Do not use a hose or a pressure washer to clean your chair.

## \Lambda DANGER! / WARNING!

- Always read the label on any commercial or domestic cleaning substances.
- Always follow the instructions carefully.

#### 8.5 Cleaning Accessories:

- All parts/ accessories such as swing away trays should be cleaned with a damp cloth.
- All lateral supports, headrest, armrests, side- guards, calf pads, lap belts and knee pads should be cleaned with a damp cloth.

#### 8.6 Cleaning controls:

Should the control of your wheelchair become soiled or dirty, it can be wiped with a damp cloth with a dilute disinfectant until clean.

### \Lambda DANGER! / WARNING!

- This is important should the wheelchair be used by more than one person to ensure there is no cross infection.
- Ensure that wafer boards, joysticks (all variants), head arrays and switches (all variants) are cleaned with a mild disinfectant and a cleaning cloth to avoid any cross infection possibilities. Following removal from chair regularly wash the sip and puff mouth piece and tube to maintain cleanliness and functionality.
- Ensure control is switched off before cleaning.

#### 8.7 Storage

To keep the upholstery and other parts of the wheelchair in good condition, store in a dry environment as close to room temperature as possible.


## A DANGER! / WARNING!

- Never store your wheelchair in direct sunlight or in a damp/ outdoor environment.
- Direct sunlight might bleach upholstery / plastic parts and cause metal parts to become hot.

#### 9.0 Disposal

The symbols below mean that in accordance with local laws and regulations your product should be disposed of separately from household waste. When this product reaches the end of its life, take it to the local collection point designated by local authorities. The separate collection and recycling of your product at the time of disposal will help conserve natural resources and ensure that it is recycled in a manner that protects the environment.

  - e. The wheelchair or part having been damaged by neglect, accident or improper use.
  - f. Changes/modifications have been made to the wheelchair or parts, which deviate from the manufacturer's specifications.
  - g. Repairs have been carried out, before our Customer Service has been informed of the circumstances.
